
Have you ever wondered what really goes on in the locker rooms at Open Door? I'm here to answer this age old question. The answer is – absolutely nothing!






Above: The Carmany family having fun.



"They're intense and demand their respect but we have fun and if we do our jobs it's all good," said Junior Julie Lafleur.


Abbie Dubois added, "They're definitely hard, but we like to have fun."

on the other hand, gets along by joking with


her teachers.



Pastor Mark W. Rice, with his many years of ministry in Spokane, Washington, came to Ohio with a goal to inspire and


encourage.
