

In any sport, it's unlikely to play seven games in a nine day period. But that's one obstacle the jr. high boy's team has had to endure this season.


This year also marks Mr. Dunckel's return to coaching the eight grade boy's team. The last time he coached was 1981. Some of this year's seniors weren't even born yet!

Jared says that practice has been a learning experience for him. He also plans on coaching next year, while trying to obtain a degree in Elementary Education from LCCC.


Hannah has always wanted to coach a basketball team, and she's excited to be working with the jr. high girls this year.




